

FROM ROCKEN END TO BINNEL

This short stretch of coastline on the southerly tip of the Isle of Wight has a magic of its own

My sister and I were born at Knowles Farm, under St Catherine's Lighthouse, and the cliffs, landslip and beaches became our childhood playground. At 6 or 7 our grandfather took us beachcombing at Rocken End where we picked up green glass fishing floats. Later we played on the rusting hulk of the wrecked Dutch coaster Volkerak, one of the last shipwrecks on this notorious coast. We spent all of our holidays swimming at Castlehaven and Puckaster, or roaming the landslip. Looking East from the cliffs by the lighthouse you can see the headland at Binnel where I now have my pottery studio. Here I use the inherent characteristics of different clays, glazes, oxides and firing schedules in making my pots. Decoration is based on observational sketches, using techniques including brushwork, wax resist and sgraffito. For this show I have also been experimenting with wood-ash glazes coloured with clay from the local cliffs.

This is the first time that Molly and I have exhibited together. We have both built up long careers in our respective fields and now the time seems right to explore our shared inheritance. Molly describes how we roamed around the cliffs and landslip. I also recall long winter evenings: the sound of the sea roaring below, sometimes the boom and grunt of the lighthouse foghorn and always the lighthouse beam flickering in a constant rhythm. There was no television, no car and nowhere to go, so we listened to the wireless (interrupted by staccato Morse code from Niton Ship to Shore Radio) and that is when we both drew and painted. I now live and work in Malvern in Worcestershire but the Island retains its hold over my imagination and I often return. St Catherine's Lighthouse, the wind swept pine tree at its gate and the constantly renewed population of magpies, crows and grazing cattle have been recurring motifs in my work over the last 20 years. In this exhibition I am showing new lighthouse paintings and a sequence of tiny ink drawings which are as much about memory as the present day.
